

Experiences and Influencers

- Parents, teachers, clergy, mentors examples, advice, guidance
- Life experiences disappointments, struggles, initiative, determination, opportunities
- Observations
 - not everyone has the same opportunities
 - dependency is contagious
 - an organization's first purpose is survival
 - government can be non-responsive



Values and Beliefs

- Hard work, diligence, dedication, and risk must be encouraged, rewarded, and valued
- Being wealthy is no sin, as long as you pay taxes, 37.5%
- "Tax the rich to feed the poor, till there are no rich no more" discourages both the rich and poor from achieving their optimum best economic outcome
- The chance for upward mobility is essential. Chance but not a guarantee. A safety net is necessary.
- Income inequality has some value unrecognized results cellphones, laptops, electric cars etc



Vision and Outcomes

- Statistics that reflect total income for the poor, government aid, private assistance taxes paid by the wealthy
- Taxation
 - eliminate earned income deductions that unreasonably favor the rich
 - eliminate the charitable deduction, tax university endowments
 - Don't change corporate or capital gains taxes.
- Government accountable, small and effective



Actions and Paths

Education

- Each high school student must take a financial literacy class.
- Increase the bottom 40%'s access to vocational high schools
- More charter schools in economically struggling areas
- Create a two-track high school graduation program, MCAS/nonMCAS pass

Employment

- Move federal and state agencies to economically challenged areas
- Encourage employers that create good paying jobs ex. Microsoft
- Recognize that income equality is sometimes in conflict with other laudable goals, environment, foreign aid, price support for agriculture
- Being poor is time-consuming. Streamline assistance.



Assessments

- Greater chances for employment will reduce poverty for those who accept the opportunity
- Increased high school graduation rates will benefit individuals and the community
- Increased taxes on the rich will decrease employment in certain parts of the economy

Experiences and Influencers

- There seemed to be no common experiences that would lead one to a progressive view
- There was a definitive way that progressives respond to their experiences noted as follows:
 - 1. Open to change and variety not bound by rules
 - 2. Feel a fundamental responsibility to their fellow persons
 - 3. Materialsim is secondary to a respect for inclusion



Values and Beliefs

Education

- will hone critical thinking capabilities thus
 - leading to the realization that they can bring about change in their own lives and in the life of their community.
 - fostering the notion that they can be successful and have a happy life
- specifically education will provide skills and schooling to all

Compassion

- The American political and economic system does not require that we share in any way other than paying our taxes.
- Because Liberals believe that we have an obligation to provide care for all, tax reform is essential.
- Capitalism needs to be curbed so that the well-being of employees rather than monetary gain is the motivation of business leaders.

Government support and regulation is essential

- IE invariably leads to higher crime rates, political corruption, health problems and general, an unhappy, unsettled, and an unproductive citizenry
- Socialism is not a dirty word! Already we benefit from socialistic government programs such as police, schools, libraries, health services, fire departments, military defense, medicare, and medicaid.
- Governmental social safety net programs are called 'socialism" and thereby discredited.
- Supporting the less advantaged is necessary to overcome income inequality.

- Low cost Community Colleges / Trade schools
- Increased mental health resources

Health Care

- Expanded Medicaid in every state
- Improve affordable health care act-reduce number of uninsured
- Reduce cost of prescription drugs

Values & Beliefs

Top Three

- Work Hard for yourself, your family, your community, and the people of the larger world.
- The Social Contract (Golden Rule, Ten Commandments, Compassion, living by the dictum of the greatest good for the greatest number. Community and Interconnection: No one is an island.
- All US citizens and participants in the US economic system owe a significant debt to that system....Our current economic and legal system is largely tilted towards those who already have wealth and are determined to keep it.

Other Elements:

- Two views on Government:
 - Governments are grossly inefficient and generally provide a poor return on investment
 - Governments, inefficient as they are, often are the only way to provide critical services as the private sector is uninterested or unable (e.g. Social Security).
- Human ingenuity has made life better for more people on the planet than ever before. It has also led to grave, existential challenges. As humans are endowed with brains and will, so we are the only solution.
- This country will collapse if the bottom 20% are not better incentivized.



Vision and Outcomes

- Our vision is to successfully facilitate economic advancement via both opportunity and then income/wealth equity of the financially marginalized members of our society
- This vision would not only succeed in a vast increase in the contribution by this group to our tax revenue base, but also reduce the need by this group to depend on assistance programs, saving our tax base additional dollars

- Address Tax/Legal Challenges

Advance Minimum Living Standards

Advancing Minimum Living Standards for all individuals and families through a carefully orchestrated set of programs and services including:

- increase minimum wage: This has improved the economy where implementedfinancial support for equitable sustainability
- financial support for equitable sustainability
- basic healthcare
- food security SNAP and others
- daycare for small children and frail adults, Introduce child-care coverage for working parents
- adequate housing
- quality education including vocational tracks and financial education
- maintaining/improving voter access
- Limit predatory lending, cap interest on payday loans, etc.

Mass. is one of 25 states that has NO requirements for high school graduation for any understanding of personal finance - including the potential pitfalls of credit card use, the implications of long and short term debt and borrowing, and similar issues.



Address Tax/Legal Changes

- Change the capital gains tax to an income tax or create a progressive capital gains approach
- Reverse the 2017 Tax Cuts and Job Act or eliminate the phase out of lower income provisions Increase the top brackets to pre-Job Act levels.
- Expand the Earned Income Tax Credit and clarify/improve the Domestic Production Activities Deduction
- Promote term limits for elected officials
- Increase transparency for political donations
- Overturn/replace/constitutionally amend the Citizens United decision
- Provide partial tax credit for corporate vocational skills training
- Close estate tax loopholes
- Limit corporate stock buybacks to pre 1980 levels

A simple change to the carried interest rule from a 20% rate to a 37% rate would increase taxes by \$180 Billion each year and would pay for the living standards proposals



Influence Corporations and NGOs

Influence Corporations and NGOs – It's unlikely that the market will lower the pay of CEOs, the best athletes, rock musicians, and movie stars

- Support the growing trend toward broader stakeholder value and enlightened leadership
- Research indicates companies and investors that embrace ESG principles outperform less enlightened companies
- Support SEC scrutiny of ESG metrics for pre-public and public companies
- Support ethical investing pressure investors, endowments, foundations, and pension plans to leverage "say on pay" provisions for executive compensation
- Similarly, watch institutional Shareholder Services (ISS) and other proxy advisory services to promote more reasonable executive compensation
- Encourage companies to increase the minimum wage, reduce systemic hiring discrimination, and eliminate
 in most cases the requirement for a BS or BA degree
- Enforce existing FTC M&A regulations
- Companies, and particular social media and media, should place their ethical responsibilities at the same level as ROI. Social media companies should change their payment structure to limit a maximum payout for false or inflammatory websites.



Mobilize Citizen Involvement

- Vote, vote for more flexible candidates willing to negotiate
- Expand your sources of information
- Buy/invest ethically according to your values
- Contribute more to nonprofits and participate in bridging-the-divide activities.
- Pay attention to the proxy voting forms you receive and look for "say on pay" voting opportunities
- Act personally and locally!



Assessments – Cons to Proposed Actions

- This is a complex problem
- We live in anxious times, when fearful people are not optimistic about change
- Media / social media tend to reduce many societal concerns to slogans, creating headwinds for thoughtful discussion, specific solutions and potential compromise
- Our political and lobbying system is tilted towards corporations and the already wealthy. It is not evil wealthy people who steal society's money, they are simply following the laws created by our elected representatives
- The Federal government is clearly dysfunctional at present and unlikely to address issues without significant voter pressure
- In world history, income inequality has been regularly addressed and sometimes partially solved. Unfortunately, any historical corrections have often included war, revolution and death



Assessments – Pros to Proposed Actions

- People can and often do act in selfless ways if they understand the problem, so education around the topic is key. We can act at the individual, local, and state level.
- Creation of a stable middle class that enjoys the dual opportunities of security and mobility is in the best long-term interests of our country and economic system
- We have the means to make lawful change by voting, and voting for more moderate candidates on both sides of the spectrum
- We can individually and in groups bring legal, political, social, and market forces to bear
- We can choose to re-frame the IE argument by positioning it as ethical, responsible, patriotic, and beneficial for the greater good.

Review: Our Agreed Top Civil Discourse Principles

- Take winning off the table
- Seek to understand
- Honor the fact of multiple truths
- Embrace your discomfort and vulnerability
- Prioritize relationships over ideas



Introducing: Full Spectrum Conversations

- **Experiences** share events and influencers that shaped your personal values and beliefs on the issue
- Values identify your defining values and beliefs, that frame the issue
- Vision share your description of the desired outcomes to resolve the issue
- Paths suggest possible alternative paths to attain your desired outcomes
- Analysis assess the strengths and weaknesses of your proposed paths



SUGGESTED TOOL ... #1

Replace Contempt with Curiosity

In response to another person's comment

When you feel *contempt* ...

... identify it

..... replace it with *curiosity*

...... and ask a non-inflammatory "why?" question

Repeat as necessary



SUGGESTED TOOL ... #2

Avoid DIVISIVE language and terminology Why?

- Reinforces stereotypes
- Fosters group think
- Makes accurate disagreement difficult to achieve
- Contributes to mutual incomprehension
- Uses language for virtue signaling and in-group bonding
- Replaces authentic expression with formulaic expression
- Communicates instantly a colorized persona
